ZDENĚK DANIEL

Zdeněk Daniel was born on 10 October 1970 in Most. He lives and works in Jablonec nad Nisou.

He studied at the Secondary Technical School in Jablonec nad Nisou. He's been interested in visual art since childhood; painting and drawing is his second greatest hobby after architecture, the profession in which he has received a number of significant awards.

When he was young he educated himself in the field of drawing under the guidance of teachers from the Secondary School of Applied Art and the Higher Secondary School in Jablonec nad Nisou.

Originally his art focused primarily on drawing historical buildings and municipal architecture. He is well known in the Jablonec region thanks to these drawings.

The Story

For me, the exhibition at Kampus Hybernská entitled "My Black-and-White Shadows, or memento mori" is an inner confession, entwined into a play of numbers and dates in the story of my life that span decades of nearly a whole century. They are like fragments making up a colourful mosaic of stories written by life.

In May 1943, 75 years ago, most members of my family were deported to the extermination concentration camp in Auschwitz-Birkenau. I was born 25 years after the end of the Second World War.

In 1988, 30 years ago, I went through a particular state of mind; it happened again in 1998. That means 20 years ago.

In this state the events of the Second World War blended in my mind...

After that I spent 10 years drawing only black-and-white pictures.

I paint mostly in colour nowadays, which is a reflection of my inner self-perception, an expression of my outlook in unity with the surrounding environment, with my world.

I wasn't alive to witness the horrors of the Second World War, for me it's an abstract topic mediated through my parents' testimonies. However, I've carried this trauma inside me since childhood as a black shadow...

After almost 20 years I've found the courage to transmit these shadows into a black-and-white reality.

The exhibition is dedicated to the 75th anniversary of my family's deportation from which my father, who was a child then, was saved as if by a miracle. Most of the family never returned ...
